CSD SECURITY THANKS YOU FOR YOUR FEEDBACK

CSD Security thanks the residents of Rancho Murieta for their feedback as changes are implemented to stretch the community's security dollar as far as it can go to provide the services the community expects. A large part of CSD's effort to provide more security services is managing costs, which includes moving from eight to six full-time benefited Gate Officer positions and covering more shifts with part-time Gate Officers. A number of part-time gate officers were brought in, trained, and are being evaluated as to their ability to successfully do the job.

As with any new initiative, there have been challenges which need to be addressed. The Security team did its best to plan and implement changes and is evaluating what is going right and where improvements are needed. Steps to address critical deficiencies such as employees not properly vetting all vehicles entering the community through the visitor lane are being addressed. Other issues that have been reported include the need for identifiable clothing, non-CSD personnel loitering in the gate house, and parking in handicapped parking spaces have also been addressed. The community pays good money for security, and the CSD Security Department is dedicated to providing the best possible security with the resources available. The community can expect to see continuous improvement.

Some positives from the recent changes include:

All patrol shifts are covered. Starting in January, two former full-time Gate Officers became Community Service Officers (CSOs) bringing the number of full-time CSOs from two up to four. This, combined with the Administrative Sergeant, makes it possible for CSD Security to cover all possible patrol shifts for the first time in several years (since FY 21-22 or further back).

Five residents of the community are in various stages to fill shifts as part-time gate officers. You are already seeing some of these individuals in the gate houses and the rest will soon be ready to serve.

Thank you again to the community for your feedback and patience as we all work together to keep the community safe.

WHAT IS THE RESIDUE ON MY HOME PLUMBING FIXTURES, FOR EXAMPLE SINK FAUCET AND SHOWER HEAD AND IS IT DANGEROUS TO MY HEALTH?

The residue that builds up and stains home fixtures is most commonly minerals and deposits from the drinking water we serve. These items are beneficial to your health and to the pipes that we use to deliver the water to your residence. They can be in the form of calcium, manganese and other minerals. They build up on the surface of fixtures due to the design of the fixture. Most sinks have aerators and screens at the end of them. These act as an area where these minerals can build up and become unsightly. A good cleaning program and regular usage of the fixtures can keep this buildup from occurring. Please see, attached in this article, a link to another article that provides tips and techniques to keep your fixtures looking clean and lasting longer.

As for staining such as a ring in the bathtub or a ring in the toilet bowl, these can be caused by bacteria that exist on the surface of your fixtures and build up where the ring of water usually rests. Simple cleaning of these areas with a very weak bleach solution or vinegar solution will also keep this ring from being unsightly. If you do not frequently use some of your water fixtures, we would recommend utilizing them from time to time to keep fresh water in them. If you are planning a long vacation on your return home, it may be wise to flush your home fixtures and go to a water spicket in the backyard and turn on the water until the water temperature decreases. This is a sign that you now have fresh water from our mains in your home plumbing system and through it.

If we do work in the area you live in and ask you to please flush your home piping this is not due to material getting into the water system during the repair. It is due to the pressure and flow disturbance breaking free those same minerals in our pipes and the possibility they will travel into your pipe and cause concerns. SPRING TIME IS MOSQUITO TIME

We have all looked forward to those pleasant evenings when we can enjoy backyard and park activities, barbecuing, and socializing with friends and family. Unfortunately, some uninvited visitors also enjoy those pleasant evenings – those pesky mosquitoes.

Now is the time to be sure the mosquito breeding areas are minimized: ensure there is no standing water, such as in bird baths or fountains,

MAKING CONSERVATION A CALIFORNIA WAY OF LIFE

It's time to start thinking about landscaping and water needs. It is possible to use less water in your yard and still safeguard your property from wildfires.

Firescaping is landscape design that reduces house and property vulnerability to wildfires. The goal is to develop a landscape with a design and choice of plants that offers the best defensible space and enhance your property by surrounding your house with plants that are less likely to burn.

- Plan a "leaner palette," with open space and less-crowded vegetation.
- Reduce fuel by replacing oily plants (such as junipers) with fire-resistant plants. Many are also drought-tolerant, like agave, white sage, rosemary, California lilac and poppy, lavender, and lantana. Check with your local nursery for more suggestions.
- Create "islands" of vegetation separated by permeable hardscape such as pebble pathways, which also help with runoff.
- Capture rainwater and use drip irrigation at night or early morning to reduce evaporation. Please be sure to observe outdoor irrigation restrictions that may be in effect.
- Clear out flammable and dead vegetation at least 30 feet from structures. Check with your local fire agency for the exact distances required in your area. Use inorganic materials such as gravel for mulch.
- Remove dead branches, grass, weeds and palm fronds, and thin out dense growth under bushes, ivy, and shrubs.
- Mow brown or dead turf to less than three inches. Better yet, replace it with fire-resistant ground cover.
- Trim tree branches to more than 6-10 feet above structures. Trim canopies so they do not touch.
- Remember to haul this debris away, and don't put it in the drainage ditches.

- Remove all dead vegetation from your yard, roof and rain gutters.
- Trim trees regularly to keep branches 10 feet from other trees and 10 feet away from your roof.
- Remove or prune flammable plants and shrubs near windows, and items that could catch fire from around house and under decks.

Zone 2 extends another 70 feet.

- Mow grass to four inches (three if it's brown).
- Create horizontal and vertical space between shrubs, grass, and trees.
- Remove leaves, needles, twigs, bark, cones, and small branches.
